Boys Town's 14th Annual Blue Water Bash Sets New Fundraising Record



Boys Town's 14th Annual Blue Water Bash, held on July 12 at the historic Roof Garden Ballroom in Arnolds Park, drew more

than 250 supporters and broke all previous fundraising records. Preliminary totals show the event surpassed last year's \$250,000 goal, with all proceeds benefiting Camp Okoboji—funding cabin maintenance, restoration and the long-term preservation of this cherished Boys Town tradition.

The evening began with an invocation by Father Jeff Mollner, Boys Town's National Director of Mission and Spirituality. CEO Rod Kempkes then welcomed guests and reflected on the camp's legacy of life-changing experiences.

"Since the 1950s, Okoboji has given our youth their first fish on the line, their first boat wake to conquer and their first night around a campfire free from worry," said Kempkes. "Every dollar raised tonight helps keep those firsts alive for the next generation."

Blue Water Bash event chairs, Lauri & Kevin Bousema and Alex & Cody Bousema, shared their experience of attending the event since 2018 and witnessing the transformative impact Boys Town and the Okoboji Campgrounds have had on the lives of Boys Town youth over the years.

One of the evening's most powerful moments came when newly elected Boys Town Mayor Evan—Boys Town's 125th mayor—received a standing ovation after sharing his journey. From homelessness in Los Angeles, to varsity sports and a promising welding career path, Evan credited Camp Okoboji with helping shape his education and personal growth.

Additional stories from current youth and Family-Teachers echoed the camp's impact, emphasizing the importance of boating, fishing, tubing and simply being kids in a safe, supportive environment.

Boys Town alumnus and 2024 Alumni Sports Hall of Fame inductee Barney Hill offered a heartfelt reflection, recalling how his week at Okoboji helped him believe that "freedom and hope were possible." Once fearing a future behind bars, Hill now splits his time between an Okoboji home and winters in Florida—proof of what transformation looks like.

The live auction—described by longtime attendees as "the best yet"—featured a custom-made motorized Templeton Rye barrel bar crafted by chair Kevin Bousema. Bidding wars were so intense that several high-demand packages, including Italian and Mexican villa getaways, were sold twice. In a show of overwhelming generosity, paddle-raisers answered the call for \$100,000 in freewill donations within minutes.

The evening closed with live music and a moving group performance of the song, "He Ain't Heavy, He's My Brother," reaffirming Boys Town's core belief in compassion and shared responsibility.

Since 1953, Camp Okoboji has offered Boys Town youth the kind of summer escape many have never had the chance to experience. Thanks to the incredible generosity shown at this year's Blue Water Bash, that tradition is set to continue for generations to come.



Next year's event will feature a Boys Town Cowboys/Boots & Buckles Bash theme and will again be held at the Arnold's Park Roof Garden on Saturday, July 18th.

These partners helped bring our programming to life through performances, field trips, mentorship and hands-on activities that left our kids smiling from ear to ear.


What makes this summer even more meaningful is the way Boys Town staff jump in judging cupcake competitions, cheering at pool races or helping with crafts and games.

The First-Ever Boys Town Olympics A Week of Joy, Community and Life-Changing Memories



There are moments in childhood that stick with you forever. These kinds of memories are so big, so full of laughter and excitement, that they become part of who you are. For the kids at Boys Town, the first-ever Boys Town Olympics was one of those moments.

Over the course of a week, families came together as "countries" to compete for gold, silver and bronze medals in a series of wildly creative events. From the official Opening Ceremonies to the final medal celebration, the campus buzzed with energy, teamwork and pure joy.

A WEEK OF UNFORGETTABLE EVENTS

No ordinary competition, the Boys Town Olympics featured events that blended imagination, physical activity and a whole lot of fun:

- » Archery (Kickball Style) Aiming for the target took on a whole new meaning!
- » Equestrian Jumping (Inflatable Horses Included) Because why not ride a bouncy steed to victory?
- » Diving (Biggest Splash & Creativity Awards) Cannonballs, flips and style points ruled the pool.
- » Surfing (Well... People Surfing) Balance, bravery and a lot of laughter.
- » Canoe Sprint (Inflatable Edition) Teamwork made the dream work.
- » Non-Traditional Triathlon (Featuring a Three-Legged Race) Because nothing bonds people like trying to run while tied together!

And of course, the week wrapped up with a Closing Ceremony, where every child was celebrated for showing up, trying hard and being part of something bigger than themselves.

IT TAKES A VILLAGE—OR IN THIS CASE, A TOWN

What made this event truly special wasn't just the games—it was the entire Boys Town community coming together to make it happen. Staff from across campus volunteered their time, energy and creativity to bring the Olympics to life. The youth care team went above and beyond, designing events that were as inventive as they were fun.

Father Flanagan and the Road to Sainthood

Father Edward J. Flanagan, founder of Boys Town, lived a life defined by faith, compassion and courage. Born prematurely in 1886 in a stone cottage in Ireland, he wasn't expected to survive


the night. But with the warmth and prayers provided by his grandfather, he did—setting the stage for a life devoted to serving the forgotten.

From early on, young Eddie felt called to the priesthood. Despite chronic health problems that forced him to leave seminary once, he returned and was eventually ordained. In 1917, he established Boys Town in Nebraska, a safe haven for at-risk boys. His belief that "there's no such thing as a bad boy" guided his work, even in the face of criticism. He welcomed children of every race, religion and background, standing firm in his mission when few others would.

After World War II, President Truman enlisted his help to advise on care for war orphans overseas. While on that mission in Germany, Father Flanagan passed away in 1948—still serving the children he loved so deeply.


Today, Father Flanagan's cause for sainthood is progressing through the Catholic Church's rigorous canonization process. This journey involves several distinct stages:

- 1. Pre-Diocesan
- 2. Diocesan Phase
- 3. Roman Phase
- 4. Beatification
- 5. Canonization
