ACTION SUMMIT

Boys Town South Florida's Second Annual Community Action Summit

Boys Town South Florida hosted its second annual **Community Action Summit** on April 25 at the DoubleTree by Hilton Hotel in Palm Beach Gardens. The Summit focused on the root causes of juvenile delinquency and strategies for mitigating it at the individual, family and community levels. The panel discussion was targeted at prevention and early intervention services to help families remove barriers, learn skills and utilize resources so they can better guide their children to grow up in safe and strong communities.



Every year, Boys Town South Florida recognizes a Family of the Year, who completes one or more of their evidencebased programs in a positive way. This year, the Family of the Year was Lori and Peter Hamlin and their

12-year-old son Chase, who participated in Boys Town's Care Coordination Services program. While we know every child deserves a chance to grow, thrive and feel loved, circumstances are different for each child. In Chase's case, his story is one of perseverance, strength and the unwavering support of those who refused to give up on him.

From the womb of his biological mom who suffered from drug addiction, Chase started facing hardships. As a baby, Chase was diagnosed with multiple vision impairments, which made his early years harder.



In 2024, the elementary school Chase attended referred him to Boys Town South Florida. For eight months, the Hamlin family received home visits from the Care Coordination Services supervisor, who shared with them different parenting and coping skills and resources to help them remove as many barriers as they could to help Chase get on a positive path. A turning point was the young boy's dedication to improving his coping skills. He learned strategies to manage his frustration, to calm down and learn about boundaries and personal space. He also learned respectful ways to share frustrations, and to talk with others about his sight challenges. With the right resources, parenting support, including 24/7 crisis call services, the family strengthened their relationship with one another and learned new ways to address issues while remaining calm.

Another important recognition presented at the Summit was Boys Town South Florida's Youth Impact Award presented to the Honorable Judge Kathleen Kroll. The Youth Impact Award recognizes community leaders who have demonstrated exceptional commitment to empowering and positively influencing the lives of young people. Judge Kroll has dedicated three exceptional decades to improving the trajectory of many children's lives.

Event attendees had the opportunity to watch the summary of the Blue Baby documentary, which follows eight youth and their journey at Boys Town as an alternative to prison. Scenes from the film showed key risk factors that impact juvenile delinquency, as well as intervention services that can help prevent youth from ever entering the juvenile justice system. Following the film, a dynamic panel discussion featured leading voices in juvenile justice, prevention services and behavioral health. The Summit was concluded with a call to action, as attendees were encouraged to contact their Florida senators to support the reauthorization of Titles II and V of the Juvenile Justice and Delinguency Prevention Act. The bill's overall mission is to enhance juvenile justice reforms by reducing unnecessary incarceration, promoting diversion programs and ensuring fair treatment within the justice system.

Boys Town South Florida is grateful to everyone who attended, including elected officials, commissioners Gregg Weiss and Bobby Powell, and School Board Member Virginia Savietto. We also thank our Mission Sponsors, Wellington Regional Medical Center and Florida Power and Light, for making this event possible.

Family of the Year: Chase's Journey of Resilience and Triumph



Every year, Boys Town South Florida honors a family who has completed one or more of Boys Town's programs successfully. These families show immense strength and dedication in the program. Chase's story embodies just that.

Boys Town South Florida's Care Coordination Services

Supervisor, Jennifer Sirois, nominated the Hamlins as Family of the Year. Jennifer worked with the Hamlin family, sharing parenting and coping skills, navigating mental health services, the school system and linking them to community resources.

Born to a mother dealing with drug addiction, Chase faced hardships from the very beginning. With no parents to support him, Chase was placed with his grandparents after he was born. As a baby, Chase was diagnosed with multiple vision impairments, which made his early years harder.

At the age of four, his grandmother became ill, forcing Chase into foster care. He had 13 different placements over the next two years, where he experienced neglect and physical abuse by foster siblings.

In 2019, after years of adversity, he was reunited with his grandparents. Lori and Peter had worked tirelessly to gain custody, and finally, in 2022, they officially adopted Chase.

In 2024, his elementary school referred Chase to Boys Town (due to frequent emotional outbursts.) With Jennifer's expertise in Boys Town's evidence-based interventions, Chase learned strategies to manage his frustration, to calm down and he also learned about boundaries and personal space. Key for him was learning respectful ways to share disappointments about his sight challenges.

Chase made strides academically by transitioning into mainstream classes, when possible, which helped improve his grades. He accomplished all his Individualized Education Program (IEP) goals and maintained near-perfect attendance for the first time ever.

Chase discovered a passion for sports, joining a local community recreation center and Special Olympics teams. These activities boosted his confidence, fostering teamwork and discipline.

Using his new skills, taught through Boys Town, Chase built strong connections with family and friends. This sense of belonging and stability played a crucial role in his emotional growth. Chase also found comfort in faith, joining his family's local church.

Today, Chase is thriving and his success story is a celebration. Every child deserves a chance

to grow, succeed and be surrounded by love. Chase's story provides hope for children facing challenges.
