9.	Chair's Report
	Presented by the Chair, Mr. Joe Ortona:
	 The National Assembly has deposited Bill 94, which is the expansion of Bill 21 that applies to all the employees of the EMSB which is the removal of anything tied to religion. There are measures now in place to bar exceptions to be given to students who miss exams due to religious holidays. There are no more accommodations of any kind for personal days or paid days for employees due to religious holidays, and the banning of wearing religious symbols which has been already in place under Bill 21. The EMSB has already voiced their position against Bill 21 which is being contested all the way to the Supreme Court of Canada. The QESBA has been invited to the Parliamentary Commission on Education and Culture to speak about Bill 94. It was a very heated debate. They expressed how we remain firm and stand by our principles and values and do not agree with this. The EMSB is an institution, and our schools should be secular and should not promote one religion over others; Mr. Ortona attended the Chai Lifeline Gala – Rebuilding Dreams, where many people were given various honors. One of our very own Parent Commissioner, Ms. Julie Kristof, was recognized as parent of the year. It was a beautiful event where people from our community came together and were recognized for their great accomplishments; The decision on Bill 40 was presented from the Court of Appeal of Quebec with a tremendous win. Every section of the Bill that was being contested except for one small one was deemed unconstitutional. It was a unanimous decision, which means that if the government of Quebec does decide to appeal, they must seek permission from the Supreme Court to be granted the right to appeal. This decision concludes that nothing will change for the EMSB and will continue to run as a School Board. The EMSB continues to show management and countrol over its schools and the education system which shows proof of responsibility and accountability; April 23rd was Holocaust Remembrance Day. A be

	Presented by the Director General, Mr. Nicholas Katalifos:
	 Mr. Katalifos congratulated Mr. Ortona for the leadership he has shown within our community; Three in-school administrators have been confirmed in their position. Effective July 1st, Mr. David

Lee will be Principal at Merton School, Ms. Cynthia Canale will be Principal at Honoré Mercier School and Ms. Jessica Doubt will be Vice-Principal at Willingdon School. On behalf of the Board Administrators, congratulations to everyone and best wishes in their new endeavors. Between March 23rd and March 25th, over 160 high school and college level exhibitors took part in Expo Sciences Hydro-Québec and representing the EMSB was Royal West Academy. Guided by science teachers, Ms. Jessica Fogel and Mr. Adam Wiltzer, Royal West sent 9 projects to the event and won several awards. Congratulations to the team from Royal West!

- On Friday, April 11th, to mark the one-year anniversary of the passing of community hero Eddie Nolan, Roslyn Elementary School held a commemorative assembly and walk in his memory. Before the walk began, the students presented a special plaque to Mrs. Mary Nolan. Mr. Nolan, who worked at Rosyln for 13 years, spearheaded the school's Annual Terry Fox Run in the Fall and raised an estimated \$250,000. Although Mr. Nolan worked for several other schools during his career, he always felt a very strong connection to Roslyn returning every year to waive the Terry Fox flag and spread Terry's message of Hope;
- In the first ever event of its kind, more than 600 students from 75 French and English high schools gathered on this day at the Centre Mont-Royal for the *Rendez-vous jeunesse sur la démocratie scolaire*. This event was organized by the Table of Directors General and Assistant Directors General of all the 5 School Boards and or School Service Centres on the island of Montreal. The objective of the event was for student council members at the secondary level to express their views and debate proposals on issues that are important and relevant to them. Thank you to Mr. Paul Carpentine and his team for putting together this event;
- Royal Vale officially unveiled the Marco Scandella Fitness Centre on April 25th. Mr. Scandella, a Royal Vale graduate, recently announced his retirement after a 14-year career as a National Hockey League defenseman. He made a generous donation of \$30,000, which will be used for scholarships and sport memorabilia to be displayed in the state-of-the-art fitness room. Mr. Scandella addressed the student body, answered questions and unveiled the sign for the fitness centre;
- Congratulations to Sheri Cameron, a Science and Physical Education Teacher at LaurenHill Academy and Karen Allen, a Guidance Counsellor at Westmount High School for being awarded the King Charles III Coronation Medal;
- Grade 6 students at Carlyle Elementary School wrote a song on mental health and the different factors that can affect our well-being. The song has already been featured on Global News and City TV Montreal. Congratulations to the students and team at Carlyle;
- The EMSB Chorale's 45th anniversary celebrations continue as they hosted an alumni *Cinq à sept* on April 25th where many former choristers originally from the PSBGM Chorale were in attendance. Celebrations will continue at their Annual Spring Gala Concert on May 3rd at 7:00 p.m. at the Oscar Peterson Hall;
- Laurier Macdonald Career Centre welcomed Quebec racecar driver Alex Tagliani to their campus. Mr. Tagliani is recognized for his impressive career in various racing categories, including IndyCar and NASCAR. 	WHEREAS the Fine Arts Core Education (F.A.C.E. School) is a unique and irreplaceable institution in Quebec, offering a bilingual, bicultural, and arts-focused education under a rare and successful cohabitation model between the Centre de services scolaire de Montréal (CSSDM) and the English Montreal School Board (EMSB);
	WHEREAS F.A.C.E. School, established in 1975 and housed in the historic High School of Montreal building on University Street, has served generations of students from both the anglophone and francophone communities;
	WHEREAS the century-old building urgently requires major renovations for the safety and security of students and personnel, which the Ministère de l'Éducation had previously committed to fund, including the cost of relocating both the elementary and high school students during the work;
	WHEREAS the Ministère de l'Éducation has now withdrawn its support for the rehabilitation project, without warning, and without any meaningful consultation with either the CSSDM or the EMSB;
	WHEREAS the Ministère's withdrawal of its support for the rehabilitation project risks permanently splitting the elementary and high school programs into separate facilities starting in the 2025–26 academic year, and directly undermines F.A.C.E.'s longstanding and pedagogically valuable model of unity and cohabitation;
	WHEREAS the EMSB has heard the clearly expressed desire of F.A.C.E. parents and staff to maintain the unique model of unity and cohabitation whereby all F.A.C.E. elementary and high school students of the CSSDM and EMSB remain in one shared building;
	WHEREAS the EMSB is committed to proactively exploring options to preserve the F.A.C.E. School's unique and valuable model of unity and cohabitation;
	WHEREAS the EMSB invites the Minister to consider whether there are potential changes to the rehabilitation project that would sufficiently reduce costs to allow F.A.C.E. School to return to its current location, without impacting safety and security of students and staff;

It is a critical part of the process of aligning a committee's or group's priorities with action; The committee looked at the priorities around paramedical services and work-oriented training paths. One thing that came up was to really have a better understanding of the line between where rehab services stop and where services are offered by schools. The schools work with a triage system, but parents are asking for some transparency around timelines and what can be expected; Budget and budget cuts were also discussed. It would be helpful to understand what the playbook is regarding the priorities of the ACSES Committee and what they can anticipate in planning strategically for the future; An exciting program is starting at John Grant called Brilliant Minds and Bright Futures on May 15th, which is a coming together and celebration of our neurodivergent community. It is inspiring to see that our schools are reaching out to the community and helping our students gain awareness of community resources. This event will take place between 6:00 p.m. and 8:30 p.m.
	18.2 Transportation and Safety Advisory Committee
	Item presented by the Chair of the Committee, Mr. Pietro Mercuri:
	 The committee discussed the updated transport budget for 2024-2025. With the addition of an extra Berlin from February to June 2025 costing \$18,000, an extra minibus from March to June 2025 costing \$12,000, and an extra taxi service from March to June 2025 costing \$18,000, the deficit is \$42,000; For the 2024-2025 school year, high school parents will be receiving transportation allocation
	 checks of \$180 to defray the costs of bus passes for students residing more than 2.4 km from their school and who are on the EMSB territory; The EMSB will continue to provide transport to Giant Steps, Yaldei, Summit and Vanguard Schools
	for the 2025-2026 school year;
	Regarding the request to obtain public transportation services for students that reside in Rivière-des- Prairies who wish to attend Rosemount High School, the committee has decided to write a letter to the entire borough council of Rivière-des-Prairies–Pointe-aux-Trembles to ask for their assistance on the ongoing request.

18.3 EMSBPC (English Montreal School Board Parents' Committee)

Item presented by Parent Commissioner, Ms. Merika Ramundo:

- The committee discussed the budget building process. The following were their priorities in order of importance:
 - Significantly increase current staffing ratios and weighted staffing ratios for professionals;
 - Continue to invest, develop and improve programs, professional services and resources;
 - Ensure food programs are maintained throughout the year without compromise to nutritional guidelines;
 - Continue to invest and improve the physical learning environment for students by increasing funding for security, health and safety;
 - Continue to invest and improve in new technologies in our schools;
 - Improved training for all teachers with regards to artificial intelligence and ethical use of it;
 - Request additional funds to reimburse public transportation fares for high school students;
 - Continue to invest and maintain the ongoing marketing of our schools;
 - The English Parents' Committee Association has launched a consultation on Bill 94. The EMSBPC will be participating in the process;
 - A third letter has been written and sent to the Administration regarding the Board-wide use of EMSB e-mail addresses by EMSB Governing Boards;
 - Recently, the English Parents' Committee Association held two workshops. On April 22nd, the first workshop was given by Dr. Mélissa Généreux from the University of Sherbrooke, where she presented the findings on the National Survey on Family Well-Being. On April 28th, the second workshop was on Digital Literacy. There will be two upcoming workshops Managing Challenging Behaviors to be held on May 5th and Consent and Boundaries on May 21st.

	Item presented by Commissioner, Ms. Paola Samuel:
	Ms. Samuel acknowledged this day April 29 th End Jew Hatred Day. Many people are not aware of this day as it has only been around for 5 years. It was established by Human Rights Attorney in 2020 aimed at combatting antisemitism and promoting Jewish rights. It is a day dedicated to standing in solidarity with the Jewish community and taking action against antisemitism. It encourages schools and communities to recognize the day through pledges, educational activities and public statements.

and communities to recognize the day through pledges, educational activities and public statements. In North America, Miami Dade School Board has adopted Jew Hatred, also did the New York City Council and in Colorado the governor has proclaimed this day as End Jew Hatred Day. Since October 7th, the rise in antisemitism in Montreal has reached unparalleled heights. School bombings, fire bombings at synagogues and school shootings highlight the urgent need for action. A total of 6,219 reported cases of hatred targeting Jews were reported to police in 2024 alone. These violent acts have significantly impacted the Jewish community's sense of safety. There is an urgent need for educational institutions to address antisemitism and promote a safe environment for all students. Both Jew hatred and Yom Hashoah serve as critical opportunities to educate students and the broader community on history and ongoing issues related to Jew hatred. Ms. Samuel calls upon allies in our community and in our school to speak up when they hear language, see symbols or behaviors that are antisemitic or hateful.

Item presented by Parent Commissioner, Ms. Julie Kristof:

Ms. Kristof attended the beautiful ceremony at the Montreal Holocaust Museum, where her father was also in attendance, a 90-year-old survivor from Budapest. They watched a documentary about the survivors who talked about their childhood, many who described their experiences from day-to-day, from friends who abandoned them, being isolated, spat on, being persecuted in different ways. This is what is happening to students in our schools today, many of whom are afraid to speak up. Tools like IHRA need to be in our schools in order to be able to identify what is antisemitism and what isn't, and administrators need to be able to apply consequences to these actions.

Item presented by Commissioner, Ms. Maria Corsi:

- Vincent Massey Collegiate is scheduled to hold their open house on May 1st from 4:00 p.m. to 9:00 p.m. All parents and families are encouraged to attend. VMC creates a stimulating educational environment for all students;
- On April 17th, Vincent Massey Collegiate held its first Walk for Love in memory of beloved teacher Ms. Tina Corolla who passed away in April, one year ago. Thanks to the generosity of the VMC community, \$9,363 were raised for the TRIM Foundation in honor of Ms. Corolla;
- Edward Murphy Elementary School held its first ever Literacy Event on April 24th, featuring a showcase of students writing talent and a hugely successful used book sale, raising \$1,000 which will be reinvested in student activities;
- Bancroft Elementary School held a fun and engaging initiative throughout the month of March to encourage the learning of the French language and culture. The interactive initiative was called Mani Musical, similar to March Madness basketball in the United States. However, in this case, participants were to predict which of 16 francophone songs would be the most popular. Voters decided which song would advance to the next round until a champion was named.
