3.	<p><u>Question Period</u></p> <p>Questions from Karine Toledano, were read and addressed by the Chair, Mr. Joe Ortona, regarding the following:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> ➤ What actions the EMSB is taking at both the school and board levels to address rising anti-Zionist hostility; ➤ Determine how these issues will be integrated into the school's educational approach so that students understand the real-world impact of harmful behaviors. <p>Question from Lisa Israelovitch, was read and addressed by the Chair, Mr. Joe Ortona, regarding the following:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> ➤ Determining how to equip educators, staff, and learners with the knowledge and tools needed to understand the historical roots of these issues.

Questions from Sarah Ettegui were read and addressed by the Chair, Mr. Joe Ortona, regarding the following:

- Ensuring that the Board's response to these forms of hostility is aligned with its statutory obligations under Quebec's Education Act and is clearly reflected in its ABAV policies;
- Identifying the mechanisms that ensure incidents targeting specific student groups are recognized as discrimination under ABAV protections.

Question from Fatima Ahmad was read and addressed by the Chair, Mr. Joe Ortona, regarding the following:

- Ensuring that any organization selected to deliver genocide education upholds principles of human rights and is not involved in supporting or enabling contemporary acts of mass violence.

Questions from Chris Eustace were read and addressed by the Chair, Mr. Joe Ortona, regarding the following:

- Did the government grant the EMSB's request to use surplus funds to balance the budget?
- Will the EMSB establish a specific spending limit for any commissioner's defense?

Questions from Christine Gravel were read and addressed by the Chair, Mr. Joe Ortona, regarding the following:

- Can the Chair confirm whether a motion has been received by the administration and transmitted to the Council of Commissioners?
- Since parents are raising concerns about the sources of funding of partner organizations, rather than their educational programming, can the Chair outline the formal process for parents to have such concerns reviewed by the Council?

Questions from Yoan Amar were read and addressed by the Chair, Mr. Joe Ortona, regarding the following:

- Could EMSB broaden its curriculum to include a fact-based, archaeology-supported course on over 3,000 years of Middle Eastern history;
- Considering ways to reinforce instruction in English vocabulary so that terms with significant historical weight are used accurately and responsibly.

A statement was made by the Chair, Mr. Joe Ortona, regarding public question period moving forward.

The rules have always been clear: the question period is open to members of the public who wish to attend in person and ask their questions. We have always respected that rule. People were here tonight, and they had the opportunity to ask their questions, which poses no issue for me whatsoever.

During COVID, meetings were broadcast but not open to in-person attendance. Because of that exceptional circumstance, we temporarily allowed written submissions. The rule itself did not change, but we made an accommodation so people could still participate. For those who submitted questions in writing, I read them aloud and provided answers. That process, however, is not part of the official rules.

This will be the last month that I accept written questions. For several months now, I've received submissions that I am not comfortable reading. If I choose not to read them, I'm accused of censorship or even threatened with being taken to the Ethics Commissioner. If I do read them, I worry that the wording, spoken in my voice, could be misrepresented.

Going forward, anyone who wishes to ask a question may do so by attending in person. This is a public forum. As long as questions are asked respectfully, follow the rules of decorum, and meet basic standards of decency, anyone is welcome to participate. But I will no longer accept questions submitted in writing.

While recognizing broader financial constraints, members noted that cuts of this scale limit parents’ ability to participate in meetings and initiatives, undermining their role as “essential collaborators” in student success; ➤ The Climate Readiness subcommittee reported progress on drafting EMSB guidelines for extreme heat and cold, which currently do not exist. Work also includes improving coordination with municipalities on snow removal and school access, and developing recommendations on ventilation, flexible outdoor space use during heat events, and clearer communication with families.
