

That's why the English Montreal School Board trustee made the decision to remove the controversial Secondary 4 history workbook Journeys Through the History of Quebec and Canada from all of the school board's classrooms. They

will take all copies of the workbook and put a sticker over the offending section and use the sticker to feature a text explaining the history and context of the Nword.



"I think it's completely unacceptable," said Jennings in a phone interview Thursday. "There is absolutely no need (to use the word)." Jennings is set to step down as trustee of the EMSB next week. She was a member of Parliament from 1997 to 2011.

For Burke, it's not just the use of the N-word but the reference to the Vallières book. "Once we get past the N-word, which is the title, we start to look at Pierre Vallières's comparison between French Quebecers in and around the Quiet Revolution and the oppression of African-Americans in the civil rights movement in the '60s, completely ignoring hundreds of years of history of slavery that preceded and probably still has an impact on the Black community.
