Summertime COVID wave more lethal than last year

Contagious strain linked to rise in deaths, hospitalizations in Quebec

Quebec's summer COVID-19 wave has proved to be far deadlier than last year's, defying expecta-tions that the virus that causes it is somehow growing milder, sug-gest the latest Health Ministry gures. As the KP.3.1.1 variant has be-

As the KP.3.1.1 variant has become predominant in Quebec, as is the case elsewhere in North America, the province recorded 117 deaths linked to COVID-19 for the month of August (30 Sunday), compared with 88 such fatalities for the whole month last year. In July, there were 109 deaths compared with 46 for the same month in 2023.

"I think those numbers are con-cerning," said Dr. Donald Vinh, an infectious diseases specialist at the McGill University Health Centre. First, SABS-COV2 (the virus that causes COVID-19) is still circulati-ing. Secondly, there clearly remain many people at risk for severe dis-ease."

Preliminary research has shown that although the KP3.1 strain is not more virulent than previous variants, it is more contagious variants, it is more contagious. In Quebec, this is reflected in the fact that the positivity rate among those tested for COVID-19 is now 23.7 per cent, the highest it's been since the winter resurgence of December 2023.

More Quebecers in their 80s died from COVID-19, followed by those in their 90s, the numbers show. However, the multisystem disease has also killed people in younger age groups, including 34 in their 30s, according to Quebec's public health institute.
