Vocabulary stimulation

Children with learning difficulties, language delays or disorders benefit from vocabulary stimulation on a daily basis.


Life can provide us with many opportunities to <u>model</u> new words to our little ones and our teens: when going for a walk, watching a movie, reading, cooking, painting, the possibilities are endless.

Modelling of new words: Consciously use more sophisticated words rather than the simple or common words.
Instead of: old → ancient

good/nice \rightarrow extraordinary, phenomenal, impressive, pleasant happy \rightarrow content, joyous sad \rightarrow unhappy scared \rightarrow frightened

- 2. Start a copybook to write down the new word in a "Personal Dictionary" by following the steps:
 - a. Write the new word: ancient
 - Explain the meaning and the child writes her/his definition: something very old
 - c. The child writes the new word in a sentence: I saw a man driving an ancient car!
 - d. Write related words (lingo: semantic map) former, old, past, early times, olden days





- If you like bigger visuals, instead of writing the words in a dictionary, make a Word-wall using Post-its or cards and attach them to your wall.
 - Go over the new words often in order to remember them.
 - Use the new words in your interactions with your child to promote generalization.
