- All in favor to have the meeting recorded to assist in the minutes taking.
- Liana Gioia and Lina Wallace read the Land Acknowledgment.

A motion to approve the suggested meeting dates was moved by Annelisa Rende and seconded by Jocelyne Cacciatore. All in favor.

e) International Trip Proposal (Approval Required)

- Mr. Vitantonio explained that last year the England trip proposal was presented late in December, which allowed parents only a short window for payments before the trip in April.
- The tender for this year's trip was done in May but there was not enough time to present it to the old governing board for approval last year.
- Angela Antonacci presented this year's international trip proposal for approval.

- Trip destination: Grecian Odyssey
- Date: March 28 to April 5 (tentative depending on flight availability)
- Students who can participate: Secondary 3, 4, and 5
- Number of students we want to take on trip is from 25 to 30.
- Price projection: \$4130 with 25 to 30 participants
- Price inclusion:
 - Flights and hotels (4 stars or better), breakfast and dinner (lunch is student expense), tips for guided tours (6) bus driver and on-site tour director, travel insurance, CFAR insurance and inscription for EF (we must take the travel insurance offered by tour company under the school board guidelines)
 - For every 9 traveler we have a free chaperon. Administration does not fall in this
 category, so the admin will travel with us in case of an emergency should arise such
 as having to return home with a student or stay behind because I student falls ill as
 an additional chaperone.

• Itinerary:

- O Day 1: we leave Montreal and fly to Athens
- On day 2: we settle in Athens and see some of the sites
- On Day 3: We tour the city of Athens and visit some of the local attractions like the Olympic stadium the acropolis and Parthenon, the acropolis museum
- On Day 4: visit Athens or an excursion
- On Day 5: we travel to Corinth and Argolida
- o On Day 6: we travel to Epidaurus and Olympia
- o On Day 7: we travel from Olympia and Delphi
- On Day 8: we travel from Delphi to Athens (last night in Athens we enjoy an authentic Greek meal with music and dance – learn the dance of Zorba)
- On Day 9: we depart from Athens to Montreal

Full coverage insurance (approx. value of \$300) is included in the price of the trip. This full coverage insurance is mandatory by the school board to alleviate any risks from uncertainty and unforeseen circumstances. A legal waiver will also need to be signed by anyone that registers for the trip.

It was also mentioned and to be noted, that students who have had any bad behavior issues at school will not be able to assist on this trip.

It was also recommended that an additional supervisor being the administrator, who is not part of the chaperons, to be funded by Fund 3. This is something that was also done last year and ensures that the student: adult ratio is respected in the case of an emergency, whereby an adult needs to stay back for a student who may be ill or injured.

A motion was put forward to approve the trip proposal as presented by Angela Antonacci. The motion was moved by Sara Di Maulo and seconded by Charles Préfontaine. All in Favor.

A second motion was put forward to accept that all costs for the expenses of one additional supervisor (be it an administrator) to assist the trip and to be funded by fund 3. The motion was moved by Casey Gagné and seconded by Jack Algieri. All in favor.

f) Sex Ed. Plan for 2023-2024 (Approval Required)

- Paul Karpontinis explained that the sex ed program begins in October and that the as taught today, different departments take on the responsibility to teach different lessons of the content as an add on in their classes.
- Under the new Quebec program, in the future, almost all the sex ed course will be taught in the new Quebec cultures course, mostly in science and ERC replacement.
- For this year that new course is not a required subject so the program will continue as in the past.
- Some of the sex ed lessons covered include:
 - Gender diversity
 - o Feelings of Love
 - Puberty
 - Dating
 - Sexual violence
 - o Contraception
 - Sexual behavior
 - Decision making
- Motion to approve the sex education plan was moved by Sabrina Ficca and seconded by Patricia Suriano. All in favor.

g) Terry Fox fundraising plan for 2023-2024 (Approval Required)

Angela Antonacci presented this year's Terry Fox fundraising plan, for approval.

This year's walk-a-thon will be held on Friday, April 26 (tentative date and schedule of level breakdown to be determined). Prior to our walk-a-thon the Terry Fox committee has planned many activities to get the students involved in this humanitarian venture. Below is a list of Terry Fox Fundraising Activities. The dates provided are tentative.

The walk-a-thon: will take place April 26 the students will report to school as usual. Throughout the first 3 periods of the day, levels will be called to the track where students will walk the track for 20mins followed by a treat. By lunch time, the activity will have been terminated, allowing teachers to continue their teaching for the day.

An alternate suggestion to the Terry Fox Walk-a-thon, is to host our very first LBPHS community color run. Parents and students are encouraged to attend and engage in school spirit. (date and time to be determined). A registration fee of 20\$ per student will be applied to register for the event. The proceeds will go to the Terry Fox Foundation.

<u>Pledge Sheets</u>: Through the monthly newsletter in the month of April, and through the social studies classes, students and their families will be provided with information pertaining to online pledges found on the Terry Fox Foundation website.

<u>Sale of Terry Fox T-shirts</u>: All year long, students may purchase a Terry Fox T-shirt (approximately 20.00\$ each) through the Council Co-op.

Non-Uniform Day: On January 15th and on March 25th (tentative upon approval), students and staff members will be encouraged not to wear the school uniform for a fee of 2.00\$.

<u>Bake Sales:</u> There will be approximately 5 bake sales scheduled during the year to help raise money for the Terry Fox Foundation. Please encourage our students to bake goods and to help the cause by buying baked goods during lunch on that day. Staff members will also be encouraged to participate in baking, supervising, and purchasing the baked goods.

Fundraising selling of St. Viator bagels: In conjunction with St. Viator bagels, the Terry Fox Committee would like to offer parents and the community an opportunity to purchase 6 bagels at a cost of 7\$ a bag. Parents will be offered a choice of sesame seed or plain bagels. Through a google form, parents place their orders and once the orders are complete, the school will distribute the bagels to the student or parent after school in November. If the sale is a success, the committee may offer another sale in the spring of 2024. All proceeds from the sale will be donated to the Terry Fox Foundation.
