The survey was conducted online among a nationally representative probability sample, using the KnowledgePanel®

A companion survey of U.S. healthcare practitioners was conducted online using established b2b panels



Total sample of n=1,702 adults ages 18+

A total sample of 408 Health Care Practitioners who had to be working in the health care sector – primarily doctors and nurses – and spend at least 25% of their time with patients\*

\*Could not have ties (self or family, full- or part-time) with the FDA, a pharmaceutical or biotech manufacturing company, a market research, public relations, advertising firm, or a health care consulting firm



# **Executive Summary**

#### State Of Affairs

Assessments of our nation's health care <u>quality</u> are fairly strong, especially among Health Care Practitioners. Still, there is a sense among some that conditions are worsening and that the complexity of our system is to blame.

### **Patient-Practitioner Relationships**

Americans overwhelmingly trust health care professionals to act in their best interest – and appreciate their help in working through insurance-related issues.

However, a majority wish their practitioners could spend more time with them during visits.

Practitioners echo this view and

sound the alarm on administrative hoops and HCP burnout.

#### Insurance

Overwhelming majorities of Practitioners must adjust care plans to avoid insurance restrictions and worry that their patients avoid seeking care. Americans feel the sting of high-cost Rx medicines, with more than half worrying that their insurer will deny necessary medicines. Both groups believe that insurance companies leverage complexity as a means of improving their bottom line.

Meanwhile, half of Americans have experienced prior authorization, an insurer UM tactic that Practitioners would like to see go away.

### Reform

Standing in sharp contrast to assessments of quality of care in the U.S., views of <u>cost</u> are quite negative: the U.S. is seen as one of the worst places, if not the worst place, to live when it comes to cost of care. Both audiences want to see doctors in the driver's seat in determining what treatments are clinically appropriate, as well as more affordable insurance options. There is broad support for checks on insurers and PBMs.




# 2 in 3 Health Care Practitioners, and nearly half of Americans, believe the U.S. is one of the <u>best</u>, if not the best, places to live for quality care

Significantly more likely to say the U.S. is as good a country as any or a worse country (54% vs. 36% of Practitioners)


Positive sentiment climbs to 62% among seniors and 51% among rural Americans

A2\_3. Quality of health care treatments / services - Over the last two-to-three years, how do you feel each of the following has changed in the U.S.?








# More than 8 in 10 Americans trust Health Care Practitioners to act in their best interest




# Helping with insurance-related issues is one way to build trust and make patients feel cared for


# But, Practitioners say that patients underestimate the number of hoops they have to jump through in providing care, and burnout is an issue








# Large majorities of both Practitioners and insured Americans see insurance companies using complexity to increase profits




# 9 in 10 Practitioners have had to adjust care because of coverage restrictions; nearly as many worry their patients are avoiding care






# Nearly 6 in 10 insured Americans worry they will be denied necessary care due to insurance / PBM restrictions

- Caregivers (27%)









### Health Care Practitioners have a very negative view of prior auth


Doctors - not insurers and their middlemen - should determine whether a prescription medicine is clinically appropriate


Insurance should work for everyone by providing affordable access to health care when it's needed







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# Both audiences link insurance companies and PBM practices with the high cost of health care in the U.S.







Congress should rein in tactics by insurers and their PBMs that drive up health care costs and make it harder for people to get the medicines they need

### There is broad support for checks on insurance companies and PBMs





### Strongly or somewhat support...

Require health insurers to **pass on any rebates/discounts** received from pharma companies on Rx drugs at the pharmacy counter, so patients pay less out of pocket for their medicines

Prevent surprise out-of-pocket costs at the pharmacy and higher out-of-pocket costs that may be caused when an insurance company does not count **copay assistance** from a pharma company toward a deductible and annual maximum out-of-pocket costs

Ensure **copay assistance** provided by pharma manufacturers counts toward plan deductibles and out-of-pocket maximums

Give health insurers more **incentives** to lower out-of-pocket costs for people who are sick and take prescription medicines

Require health insurers to set a **maximum limit** for what enrollees pay out of pocket just for prescription medicines each year


